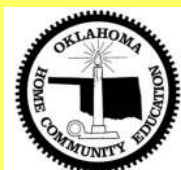

RELEASE OF LIABILITY

Participation in the Craig County Free Fair as an exhibitor, owner, handler or volunteer shall constitute a release of liability of the C.C.F.F.B., its officers, directors, agents and employees, and of Craig County and the Board of County Commissioners for any personal injury or damage to animals or property occurring at the Craig County Free Fair. Each exhibitor (or exhibitor's parent, if a minor), owner, handler or volunteer shall indemnify and hold harmless the C.C.F.F.B., its officers, directors, agents and employees, Craig County and the Board of County Commissioners from all claims, demands and causes of action and expenses of every kind arising out of any acts or omissions of the exhibitor, owner, handler or volunteer or animals in the care and control of any such person. Presentation of a signed entry form or appearance on the grounds of the Craig County Free Fair as an exhibitor, owner, handler or volunteer shall be deemed acceptance of the conditions of this release.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

For 2021, Poultry, Rabbits and Bucket Animals will be released after their show. Indoor Exhibits will be released Saturday at 2 pm and should be moved out of building by 3 pm. Livestock (Swine, Sheep, Goats, Beef) will be released Saturday at 2 pm. Premium checks will be available at 2 pm. Livestock exhibitors must present a signed pen card in order to receive a premium check. Please do not begin removing your exhibits until 2 pm. An exhibitor removing exhibits early will forfeit his/her premiums.

CONCESSIONS

All concessions are sponsored by the Craig County Fair Board.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

The Fair Board strictly prohibits the use, sale or possession of alcoholic beverages on the Craig County Fairgrounds at any time.

CRAIG COUNTY FAIR LIVESTOCK ENTRIES

General Rules

1. Only members regularly enrolled in a Craig County 4-H club or FFA chapter may enter the Craig County Fair. To be able to show livestock, the exhibitor must be 8 years old on or before June 30 and in 3rd grade. An exhibitor who has graduated from high school and is enrolled in college shall be allowed to carry to completion a project that was underway at the time of initial enrollment in college. Cloverbuds are ineligible to compete in 4-H and FFA Fair Livestock shows, but may exhibit Bucket Animals, Rabbits and Poultry.
2. All livestock must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor. Ownership of the market animal will be determined at the time of tagging.
3. Per specie, an exhibitor may show a maximum of 4 entries in the market class and 4 entries in all breeding classes.
4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, other exhibitors, breed representatives, show officials or Fair Board members before, during or after the event may result in an individual or group being expelled, placed on probation, declared ineligible or barred from the Fair.
5. Once checked in, the animal must remain on the premises until the official livestock release time of Saturday 2 pm. For 2021, Poultry, Rabbits and Bucket Animals will be released after their shows.
6. No diseased animal shall be permitted to be exhibited or to occupy the exhibit stalls and every precaution shall be used to enforce the rule. The Fair Board will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained by anyone through a violation of these rules.
7. Any drugs given to animals must be approved by the Fair Board and a Fair Board member must be present when drugs are given. Exhibitors violating these rules will be asked to leave.

Pre-Entry

8. In order to enter the Craig County Fair, all livestock must be pre-entered: **market animals by May 12, 4-H/FFA horses and all other livestock, including rabbits, poultry, bucket animals, prospect steers and breeding stock by June 30.**
9. Early Market Tagging - exhibitors may obtain market tags prior to tagging events, but all market animals must be brought to one of the tagging events on May 8 or 12 for the market animal to be checked in with tag in ear.
10. Each exhibitor may pre-enter 5 market animals of each specie, but only 4 may be shown at the Fair.
11. A Craig County Fair tag will be placed in one ear of the market animal at tagging. If the animal has a tag from another fair, that tag may **not** be used as the Craig County Fair tag.
12. If a market animal loses its Craig County Fair tag, the Fair Board is to be notified immediately so it can be replaced. No market animal may come on the fairgrounds without a Craig County tag in ear and must have a Craig County Fair ear tag to show at the Craig County Fair. **NO ANIMALS WILL BE TAGGED AT WEIGH-IN.**
13. Family Nominations - At tagging, the market animal may be nominated by either an exhibitor or family. For family nominations, a 4-H or FFA member within the family (sibling, step-sibling, legally adopted) must show the animal at the fair. The nominating and showing exhibitors must all reside in the same household. At the time of Official weigh-in, the final exhibitor decision must be made.

Pen Assignment

14. Pen assignments for all livestock will be made by the Fair Board. Pen changes must be approved by the Fair Board.
15. All animals must be in good health. No animal affected with a disease will be permitted on the premises.

Weigh-In

16. At the Official weigh-in time, an animal will be weighed one time for the official Fair weight. Scales will be open for a limited time prior to the official weigh-in for exhibitors to use.
17. Market ear tags must be **clean and readable** at weigh-in.
18. All market class exhibits must have an exhibit card filled out at weigh-in. The card is to be turned into the show ring official after placement in the class.
19. Some livestock species require health papers for showing and breed registration papers for breed classes. These requirements are specified under the show rules for each specie. The exhibitor must present health/registration papers, if required, at weigh-in/ check-in.

Cleaning of Stalls & Pens

20. Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding for their pens.
21. Exhibitors are responsible for the upkeep and cleaning of their stall/ pen space at the Fair. Failure to do so will result in the exhibitor forfeiting his/her premium.
22. Exhibitors that tie their animals out overnight need to ensure tie-out areas are clean before leaving.
23. Pens and tie-out areas must be cleaned before premium checks are issued. Cards indicating pens and tie-out areas have been cleaned must be signed by the appropriate official before premium checks will be issued.
24. Put used bedding in the designated area. Do not put trash in used bedding.

Showing of Animals

25. Exhibitors must dress appropriately in clean pressed jeans, shirt with collar and 4-H or FFA emblem. 4-H and FFA jackets are not required during the show.
26. Exhibitors, leaders, advisors and parents will conduct themselves in a positive manner, showing courtesy to the public, other exhibitors and their livestock, and will cooperate with superintendents, Fair Board members and Fair officials.
27. The exhibitor entering the show animal must show the animal. If an exhibitor has more than one in the same class, a Craig County 4-H or FFA member can be used as a substitute showman with approval of the Livestock Superintendent.
28. No parents, instructors, leaders or agents other than designated ring officials shall be allowed in the show ring during livestock shows, nor may anyone assist from the sideline. Violation will result in disqualification of contestant and he/she will not be eligible for premiums.
29. If an exhibitor is caught giving illegal drugs such as Ace or other tranquilizers to an animal, or forced filling an animal by any means including stomach pumps, they will be disqualified and asked to leave.
30. All exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals throughout the Fair. The Craig County exhibitor may be assisted by his/her immediate family or agricultural education teacher, Craig County extension agent and other members of his/her respective 4-H club or FFA chapter or Ag Booster representatives. The official Craig County 4-H volunteer leader as designated by the county extension staff will be permitted to assist the youth under his/her supervision. The exhibitor must be present and assist with grooming his/her animal in preparation for showing.
31. All animals awarded 1st place will be judged for champion in their respective groups, including single entry class exhibits.

Protests

32. The decision of the judges shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in the case of a written and signed protest. Said protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be provided to the Fair Board. Any protest of an entry must be made no later than 2 hours before the show and any protest of an award must be made no later than 2 hours after the award was made.

Fair Premiums

33. Fair premium checks will be available at the fairgrounds on Saturday at 2 pm, provided the exhibitor has met all requirements. Fair premium checks not picked up at the fairgrounds may be picked up at the OSU Extension Office.

Premium Sale

34. An exhibitor may sell only one animal in the Premium Sale. If an exhibitor has 2 species qualify for the sale, the higher placing animal will qualify for the sale. The exhibitor will not make the decision. An exhibitor may sell all animals that qualify as Grand Champion Market animal. An exception to this rule may be made if the exhibitor wishes to pull one of his/her Grand Champion Market animals to allow the next alternate to enter the Premium Sale in that species. The Fair Board must be notified by 3 pm Friday on that decision.
35. Sale order and Premium Sale animals will be determined after the grand drives of each species. After Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions are selected, each breed will have a breed order selection. After Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are selected, each specie will have a preliminary sale order selection. Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions do not automatically make the Premium Sale in species that show by breed.

36. The Fair Board reserves the right to change the below number of premiums sold in each specie based on the number of animals by specie after the Market animals are confirmed to show in the current year Fair.
- A. 11 premiums will be sold in the Market Steer division.
 - B. 17 premiums will be sold in the Market Swine division.
 - C. Approximately 17 of the Market Lambs and Market Goats combined total will make the Premium Sale. Proportions of these two species will be determined by the actual number shown at the Fair.
37. Premium Sale participants must wear appropriate 4-H or FFA jacket.

Livestock Showmanship

38. Showmanship trophies will be awarded in Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goats, Poultry and Rabbits.
39. Only exhibitors that have exhibited an animal in the specie may participate in the showmanship for that specie.
40. A substitute showman that helped another exhibitor show an animal is not eligible to compete in the Showmanship class, unless the substitute showman also showed his/her own animal for that specie.
41. There will be three age divisions for Showmanship with age of the exhibitor based on his/her age on or before June 30 of the current year:
- Senior - Ages 16 - 19
 - Intermediate - Ages 13 - 15
 - Junior - Ages 8 - 12

Wilmer Elliott Memorial Award

A cash award of \$25 will be awarded to recognize a relatively new 4-H or Cloverbud participant in the Fair that demonstrates courtesy, cooperation, teamwork, broad range of interests, active participation, positive attitude and a willingness to learn.

Premiere 4-H Club and FFA Chapter Awards

The top 4-H club and FFA chapter in the Livestock Division will receive a cash award of \$20 to recognize their group participation and achievement. Members must designate the 4-H club or FFA chapter they belong to. Selection will be based on the following criteria:

Reserve Champion & 1st place	5 points
2nd place	4 points
3rd place	3 points
4th place	2 points
5th place	1 point

4-H & FFA BEEF

Rule 1: Where purebreds are exhibited, the exhibitor must have transfer or registration certificates in the exhibitor's name. All grade beef exhibits must have a certificate of ownership in the exhibitor's name. A certificate showing proof of the birthday of the animal is required. Beef heifers showing in Class 6 must provide a certificate showing proof of pregnancy. **All beef heifers must be registered in the exhibitor's name by July 1 of the current year Fair.**

Rule 2: All cattle must be halter broke to lead. If they will not lead, do not bring them.

Rule 3: The Heifer Show (202 class 1-8) is a "blow and go" show.

Trophies will be awarded to all Bucket Animal exhibitors.

Rule 1: Exhibitor must be an active Craig County Cloverbud member, age 5 - 8 years.

Rule 2: Bucket animals must have been born between January 1 and May 1 of this year. The bucket animal must be a newborn or orphan animal that is bucket or bottle fed. The animal must be healthy. A Swine entry must follow rules 2 & 3 for 4-H/FFA Swine.

Rule 3: An exhibitor may show only one animal per specie. No buck goats or ram lambs allowed. Bucket animal is not to exceed 400 lbs.

Rule 4: The animal must have been raised as a project by the active Cloverbud member. If purchased, it must have been bought at least 30 days prior to the fair

Rule 5: Bucket animals are not eligible for market or breeding classes or showmanship. The purpose of the bucket animal class is to help the Cloverbud member learn and understand the care and feeding of animals at an introductory level.

Rule 6: For 2021, check in is Friday 7:30 - 8 am and release is after the Bucket Animal Show.

4-H & FFA SWINE

Rule 1: All swine must have an 840 EID tag to be eligible to show.

Rule 2: All swine are to have a CVI within 72 hours of arriving at the fairgrounds for check/weigh-in that says "The farm of origin of swine has not had any clinical signs or diagnosis of PEDv in the last 10 days".

Rule 3: All swine papers must indicate a negative test for pseudo-rabies or that they are from a qualified pseudo-rabies free herd, within 30 days prior to the show for Breeding Swine and after June 1 for Market Swine.

Rule 4: Market Swine entries must weigh minimum 180 lbs. Swine that do not meet the minimum weight limit of 180 lbs will show in separate classes before the Market Swine classes and will not be eligible to participate in the Premium Sale.

Rule 5: Any breed not listed will show in crossbreed class.

Rule 6: Swine do not have to be registered, but must show a predominance of breed.

Rule 7: Use only water in grooming, no oil or powder.

Rule 8: If less than 3 swine are entered in a breed, those swine will show in All Other Breeds (AOB) class.

CRAIG COUNTY FAIR INDOOR EXHIBITS

Rules and Regulations

Interpretation, Amendments and Violations

1. The Craig County Fair Board has the discretion to make all final decisions and reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the Fair held under the management of the Fair Board.
2. The Fair Board reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment deem advisable, and in all events of conflict of general and special rules, the latter will govern.
3. Any person who violates any of the special or general rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums, and be excluded from showing in the Craig County Fair the following year.

Entry Requirements

4. All entries will be identified by the exhibitor's number until after judging is completed. Each exhibitor will have only one exhibit number.
5. The Craig County Fair is free and open to residents of Craig County and/or members of a Craig County 4-H club or FFA chapter who may reside in another county. All agricultural produce must have been grown in Craig County by the producer in the current year. Canned fruit and canned vegetables are an exception.
6. All indoor exhibits must be in place by 6 pm Monday, flowers by 12:30 pm Wednesday.
7. It is the **exhibitor's responsibility** to see that his/her exhibits are properly listed with the superintendent of each department with the exhibitor's correct address and acknowledging complete ownership in all cases.
8. No exhibits will be released until 2 pm on the closing day of the Fair. Any exhibitors removing exhibits early will forfeit premiums.

Exhibitor's Duties and Privileges

9. If it be ascertained that any exhibitor has made or caused to be made any false statement in regard to any animal or article, or if any exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judges in the performance of their duty, he/she shall be excluded from all competition on the grounds of the Craig County Fair and any awards that he/she may have been awarded shall be forfeited.
10. The decision of the judges shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in the case of a written protest.

Power and Liabilities of the Fair Board

11. The Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to determine all questions regarding the awarding of premiums.
12. The Fair Board reserves the right to take what action they may deem just and proper in the case of fraud or attempted fraud in connection with the exhibits.
13. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove from the fairgrounds any exhibit that may have been falsely entered or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable or to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature or advertising material of any kind that may be deemed objectionable by them
14. No claim for injury to any persons or property shall ever be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Craig County Fair Board officers, or agents of same, on behalf of any person, firm or corporation or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having a license to exhibit on the fairgrounds or to occupy space thereon.
15. The Fair Board shall not be responsible for exhibits left on the grounds after 6 pm the last day of the Fair.

Premiums and Awards

16. Points will be awarded as:

1st Place	10 points
2nd Place	9 points
3rd Place	8 points
4th Place	7 points
Remaining entries	1 point
17. An exhibit without competition in a class shall be awarded such premiums as, in the opinion of the judges, the exhibit on its merits deserves, and premiums will not be awarded on an unworthy article.
18. All premiums will be paid at the fairgrounds on the last day of the Fair, provided the exhibitor has met all the requirements necessary. Premium checks not picked up at the fairgrounds may be picked up at the OSU Extension Office.

19. It is the duty of the superintendents to receive exhibits in their departments, properly classify them and assist the judge(s).
20. In paying premiums, the evidence of award shall be the superintendent's record confirmed by the Secretary of the Fair Board or designee.

CRAIG COUNTY FAIR BOARD AWARDS

Six cash awards (two-\$50, two-\$30, two-\$20) will be awarded to the **4-H or FFA members** who obtain the most points for entries in the **Indoor Exhibit Building** only. This includes the Open Class and Agricultural Mechanics exhibits.

Three cash awards (one-\$50, one-\$30, one-\$20) will be awarded to the **Open Class adult exhibitors** who obtain the most points for entries in the **Indoor Exhibit Building** only.

4-H EXHIBITS DIVISION

General Rules

Rule 1: The 4-H member should enter the class that matches his/her grade (grade as of September 1 of the 4-H year.) **If youth are in the 3rd grade, they must be 8 years old by Sept.1 of the current year.**

Rule 2: All exhibits must have been made and completed by the exhibitor during the last year, and cannot be entered more than one time, except for classes, which are collections that are added to in successive years.

Rule 3: 4-H members who enter crops and horticulture must be able to prove that such crops entered in the 4-H member's name were produced by the member during the current year.

Rule 4: All 4-H exhibits should be the original work of the 4-H member. When information is taken from books, publications, magazines or from the internet it should be expressed in the 4-H member's own words. The 4-H member must reference the source of the information by using an asterisk (*) or a number and the name of the source at the end or bottom of paper, poster, or educational display, following an asterisk or corresponding number in text. No copyrighted or trademark protected written or visual material (pictures, photos, drawings, illustrations, etc.) should be used from books, magazines, publications, professional photographers, or from the internet without permission from the original creator.

Rule 5: EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS - All educational displays must have stable, free-standing backs with sides attached. This includes Sec. 301 and educational displays in specific project areas. Educational displays must be 3-dimensional. Do not include valuables, food items that will spoil or potentially harmful products (such as aspirin, cleaning products, chemicals, etc.) in any educational display. Potentially harmful products will be discarded. Text of display should be readable from at least 10 feet away.

Rule 6: POSTERS - All poster boards must be backed with foam board for display purposes. This can be done after making the poster or poster can be made directly on the correct sized (14x22) sized foam board. For display purposes, exhibitors are encouraged to laminate all posters or cover them with clear plastic film. Posters must be signed and dated on the back with a permanent marker before laminating. All posters must be flat (no 3-dimensional posters). Text on posters should be readable from at least 10 ft. away.

Rule 7: SIGNING AND DATING EXHIBITS - Exhibits should be permanently signed and dated, in an inconspicuous location, if material permits. Some exhibits that should be signed and dated are posters, most expressive arts including fine art, ceramics, woodworking and woodcrafts, herbarium cards, seed boards, forestry exhibits and model rocketry.

Rule 8: REQUIRED TRADEMARK DESIGNATION FOR USE OF 4-H CLOVER - When using the official clover with H's, the tail should curve to the right and the words 18 U.S.C. 707 must appear under the lower right leaflet, unless poster and clover are hand drawn. For more information on proper use of the 4-H clover, please refer to <http://4h.okstate.edu/educators/4-h-name-and-emblem>.

Prints must be no smaller than 4"x6", no larger than 5"x7" (except when panoramic prints), except classes 5, 10, 14, 18, and 22 where prints may be up to 8"x10". • Prints must be securely attached to the surface of a single black or white (not colored) poster board, foam core or mat board. Photos will be disqualified if on regular printing paper or cardstock. No double matting, use of multiple layers or more than one color. The entire print must be seen and cannot be masked in any way. Boards must be 14"x14" for all classes.

• On the front of the board, there must be a title (e.g. My Trip to the Zoo) **and** each photo must have a caption giving the viewer more information about the photo. The back of board must include name, county, # of years in 4-H photography project, camera type (digital SLR, smart phone, digital point & shoot or 35mm film) & megapixels, if camera is digital.

• One first place exhibit will be awarded a "Best of Show" rosette.

Posters will be judged on 1) educational idea portrayed, 2) public appeal, 3) creative & original ability presented. Copyrighted or trademark cartoon characters & designs must not be used due to copyright restrictions.

Flat flyer (one-sided) designed by the exhibitor to promote a club or county 4-H educational program or activity. Computer generated flat flyer (8½"x11" or 8½"x14"). Flat flyers should be securely attached to an appropriately sized poster board.

The arm of the catapult must be adjustable from the center to an offset (one side of the beam is longer from center pivot point). Use at least 5 different types of materials or parts (craft sticks, brads, dowels, etc). Use weights and gravity as the power source. Catapult cannot be larger than a 3 foot cube. Launch a marshmallow at least 6 feet. A journal or engineering notebook should be included to describe the creation, purpose & function of the device. Explain how you built & tested your catapult. Chart your marshmallow launches.

Rubber Band-Powered Vehicle Design Challenge

Design a wheel-driven vehicle powered only by 1 rubber band (size #64), which will transport a 1 pound "load" (box of baking soda) at least 9 ft. on a smooth flat floor while remaining within the boundaries of a 3 ft. wide parallel track. Speed is not a criteria. There are no restrictions on materials, size, weight or number of wheels. The only energy source is the elastic energy of 1 rubber band. Commercially assembled vehicles are **not** permitted. However, commercially manufactured components may be used as parts of the vehicle. The vehicle must be self-starting. Propulsion must be through the wheels. Transferring energy of the rubber band to wheels via gears, fly wheels etc. is encouraged. No remote control devices permitted. A journal or engineering notebook should be included to describe creation, purpose & function of device. Explain how you built & tested your vehicle & if you made any modifications. Chart collected data & explain how you measured improvements.

The Future of Agriculture Research Challenge Displays

This display will illustrate current research & futuristic thinking that is changing the agriculture field & agricultural-based careers. Members will research current trends, future thoughts & ideas for continuing to effectively feed the world. Projects should have a minimum of 3 scholarly references identifying where & when the information was published. Projects may:

- Describe the challenging need for increased food production for a growing population
- Describe a new agricultural production technique or an emerging agricultural technology that will enhance or improve our agricultural & food production systems

- Describe new STEM-based careers in agriculture

Displays should use research-based information & resources to answer questions similar to "What will the future of Agriculture look like?", "How will agriculturalists feed an ever-growing population?" or "What are future careers in agriculture?" Research displays should be mounted on a free-standing display board not to exceed 3'x4'. A complete research report should be included in a notebook with the display.

- Behavioral & Social Sciences
- Physical Sciences
- Biochemistry, Medicine, & Health Sciences
- Botany & Zoological Sciences
- Computer Science
- Earth & Space Sciences
- Engineering
- Environmental Sciences
- Mathematics

The Skill Mastery sheet <http://4h.okstate.edu/projects/design-and->

[construction/curriculum-and-patterns.htm](#); is an education tool to guide project work. Fair exhibits have been carefully selected & directed for members to investigate & learn specific skills/information & to demonstrate mastery of these skills information.

The end product is being evaluated on the skills "learned/mastered." The skill sheet serves as the member's "personal reflection" & communicates to the judge what was learned. The skills sheet is to be used as a planning tool. This may require members, leaders & educators to look up terms & learn techniques as part of the educational process. Resources, instructions & project guides are posted online. Members are encouraged to seek out other valid resources which teach proper technique & knowledge in the areas of design & construction.

General skills to be mastered in project in ADC, IDC & HTDC:

Structural Design: Construction technique, size, form, color & texture suited to the materials & product end use.

Elements of Design: The finished project illustrates the member is learning or "mastering" the basic elements of design - line, shape or form, texture, color & space.

Principles of Design: The finished project illustrates an awareness & application of the principles of harmony, proportion, balance, rhythm & emphasis adding dimension, interest and/or appeal to the finished product.

Surface Design: This is any lines, shapes, colors, textures or materials applied to the product or item that creates an emotional or personal quality, individuality & creative expression without disturbing initial/end purpose. Design is that "something" which makes the item unique to the individual designer.

Descriptions: Exhibits requiring a description can be typed or neatly hand-written. It should be 1-2 pages, double-spaced, 12 pt. font. Report must be attached securely to exhibit. A 4-H member may enter only 1 exhibit per class.

4-H Apparel Design & Construction (ADC)

Level 1 - Grades 3-4

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for ADC Level 1 project work. Some classes have specific Level 1 skills/techniques that must be incorporated into the exhibit:

1. Simple tops - shirt, tank top, t-shirt, vest, poncho, costume, similar item. No lined garments. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 1 Mastery Sheet: Buttons, Casing, Hem, Seams, Seam Finishes
2. Simple bottoms - shorts, capris, pants, skirt, costume, similar item. Garment is not to be lined, have pockets or a zipper. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 1 Mastery Sheet: Hem, Seams, Seam Finishes, Waistband
3. Non-human apparel - doll, pet or livestock garment/costume, similar item
4. Simple sewn fashion accessory - sewn hat, scarf, bag, wallet, purse, mittens, string-pack or textile based jewelry, similar item.
5. Knitted/crocheted fashion accessory - knitted/crocheted hat, scarf, bag, wallet, string-pack or textile based jewelry, similar item. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 1 Mastery Sheet: Crochet, Knitting

Level 2 - Grades 5-6

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for ADC level 2 proj work:

6. Lined or unlined one-piece garment with facing - top, robe, jacket, dress, jumpsuit, vest, costume, similar item. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 2 Mastery Sheet: Facing, Interfacing, Seam Finishes
7. Lined or unlined bottom with one or more: pocket, waistband or facing - shorts, capris, pants, skirt, costume, similar item. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 2 Mastery Sheet: Facing, Pocket, Waistband, Zipper. No invisible zippers in level 2. Waistband can be a flat front band and elastic back.
8. Lined or unlined two-piece garment with one or more: pocket, waistband or facing - coordinating top & bottom, jacket/vest with bottom/dress, PJs, costume, similar 2-piece garment. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 2 Mastery Sheet: Facing, Pocket, Waistband, Zipper. No invisible zippers in level 2. Waistband can be a flat front band and elastic back.
9. Non-human apparel - doll, pet or livestock garment/costume, similar item
10. Sewn fashion accessory - sewn hat, scarf, bag/string-pack/purse/backpack/hip pack, wallet, or textile based jewelry, similar item
11. Knitted/crocheted fashion accessory - knitted/crocheted hat,

scarf, bag, wallet, string-pack or textile based jewelry, similar item. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 2 Mastery Sheet: Crochet and/or Knitting

Level 3 - Grades 7-8

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for ADC level 3 proj work:

12. Blouse/shirt with sleeves & closure - Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 3 Mastery Sheet: Buttons and Buttonholes, Fasteners, Sleeves, Zippers. No jackets, coats or vests.
13. Lined or unlined bottom with zipper and pocket(s). Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 3 Mastery Sheet: Interfacing/Underlining, Lining, Pockets, Zippers. Pocket style must be one described in the skill sheet.
14. Lined or unlined two-piece garment - coordinating top & bottom, jacket/vest with bottom/dress, PJ's, uniform, costume, similar item. Exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 3 Mastery Sheet: Buttons and Buttonholes, Fasteners, Interfacing/Underlining, Lining, Pockets, Sleeves, Zippers.
15. Sewn fashion accessory with closure/fastener and seams - hat/earmuffs, wallet, bag/purse/backpack, costume accessory (gloves, apron, bustier), textile based jewelry, similar item. See specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 3 Mastery Sheet: Buttons and Buttonholes, Fasteners, Seams and Seam Finishes, which may apply.
16. Fashion garment or accessory created by knitting/crocheting/tatting/felting or similar technique. No accessory is to be constructed from commercial/purchased fabric (woven, knit, felt, etc). Knitted or crocheted exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 3 Mastery Sheet: Crochet and/or Knitting
17. Redesigned original apparel/fashion garment with before & after (garment being worn) pictures and a written description of the design & construction process the member undertook and reason(s) for "redesign." See Frugal Fashion Instruction Sheet and other OK Recycle & Redesign resources.

Level 4 - Grades 9-12

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for ADC level 4 proj work:

18. One-piece lined or unlined garment - pants, skirt, coat, jacket, dress, jumpsuit, uniform, formalwear, costume, similar item with 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 4 Mastery Sheet: Collar/Cuff, Buttons and Buttonholes, Fasteners, Hem, Interfacing/Underlining/Interlining, Lining, Seam, Seam/Finish, Zippers.
19. Two-piece lined or unlined ensemble/coordinate - coat/jacket/vest/shirt/blouse with dress/pants/slacks/skirt/etc., suit, costume, similar two-piece with 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 4 Mastery Sheet: Collar/Cuff, Buttons and Buttonholes, Fasteners, Hem, Interfacing/Underlining/Interlining, Lining, Seam, Seam/Finish, Zippers.
20. Fashion garment or accessory created by knitting/crocheting/tatting/felting or similar technique. No accessory is to be constructed from commercial/purchased fabric (woven, knit, felt, etc). Knitted or crocheted exhibit must have 2 or more of the specific skills/techniques under the following headings Level 4 Mastery Sheet: Crochet and/or Knitting
21. Functional fashion garment or accessory designed for special needs - "Special needs" being the individual requirements of a person with a mental, emotional, physical disability or disease. *MUST* include description of whom it was made for, why the need, any special adaptations per the individual's request, & other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Examples: apron/tidy-top, garment adaptation, mastectomy pillow, cancer cap/hat, slippers/shoes, wheel chair - coat, gloves, backpack, cell phone caddy, etc. The exhibit is for garments/accessories worn by the person. See IDC class 40 for other items. See Citizenship through Service Learning and Sewing for Special Needs instructions.
22. Recycling/upcycling apparel on a budget - focus is on the skill/technique mastery applied to the recycling/upcycling of a garment with a budget of \$10. Must include an expense sheet for any supplies/garments purchased. In kind or on-hand supplies used in the design and construction are to be listed on the expense sheet. Exhibit must include before and after (garment being worn) pictures and a written description of the design and construction process the member undertook. See Frugal Fashion Instruction Sheet and other OK Recycle & Redesign resources.

All Grades - ADC

23. All grades: Apparel Design Project Portfolio - is a great record keeping tool. It will be a valuable source for ideas & future projects, a place to share any project work done in ADC, & provide a place to show samples of new techniques or knowledge explored in ADC. The notebook must have 3 sections - 1) Projects/Products, 2) Sample Technique Pages & 3) Creative Inspirations & Ideas. See Design Portfolio instructions. All portfolios will be judged together.

4-H Interior Design & Construction (IDC)

IDC project must be made largely from a textile product unless otherwise stated. A textile is a flexible material made of fiber/thread/yarn. Textiles are formed with various methods including weaving, knitting, crocheting, knotting or felting. Other words for textiles are cloth and fabric.

Level 1 - Grades 3-4

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for IDC level 1 proj work. The following headings on the Mastery Sheet will apply to many of the listed projects: Buttons, Casing, Gathering, Hem, Seam, & Seam Finish.

24. Home accent kitchen - apron, food caddy/warmer, appliance cover, message center/board, simple curtains, table cloth, simple table runner, hand/dish towel, potholders, hot pad, lunch bag, one placement, two napkins, similar item. Exhibit should illustrate some skill mastery of hand or machine sewing techniques.
25. Simple storage bag without zipper - laundry, jewelry, cosmetic/toiletry/shaving/pencil, book/electronic cover, similar bag for home/school/office/shop/vehicle/exercise/hobby/barn/etc. No fashion accessory type bags.
26. Home accent storage - bucket caddy, hanging storage unit, under-bed storage, basket liners, storage box, locker storage, scrapbook cover, similar item. No bags.
27. Seasonal décor sewn from fabric - table runner, one placemat with napkin, wall hanging, yard flag/banner/windsock, centerpiece, decoration, similar item sewn by hand or machine stitching. This class is not intended for full size quilts/blankets which do not fit "seasonal décor."

Level 2 - Grades 5-6

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for IDC level 2 proj work. The following headings on the Mastery Sheet will apply to many of the listed projects: Buttons and Buttonhole, Casing, Crochet, Darts, Facing, Fasteners, Gathering, Hem, Interfacing, Knitting, Pleats, Seam, Seam Finish and Zipper.

28. Home accent bedroom - 2 pillow cases, 2 coordinating pillows, pair of curtains or any combination of 2 coordinating pieces (blanket/quilt with binding, lamp shade, lap desk, rug-latched/woven/braided/etc., painted floor cloth, other item for the bedroom)
29. Storage bag with some type of closure other than drawstring - laundry, jewelry, cosmetic/toiletry/shaving/pencil, gym/tool/equipment/sewing bag, book/electronic/computer cover, garment bag, similar bag for home/school/office/shop/vehicle/exercise/hobby/barn/etc. No fashion accessory type bags.
30. Home accent storage - bucket caddy, hanging storage unit, under-bed storage, basket liners, storage box, locker storage, scrapbook cover, similar item
31. Seasonal décor sewn from fabric - table runner, 2 placemats with napkins, wall hanging, yard flag/banner/windsock, centerpiece, decoration, similar item sewn by hand or machine stitching This class is not intended for full size quilts/blankets which do not fit "seasonal décor."

Level 3 - Grades 7-8

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for IDC level 3 proj work: The following headings on the Mastery Sheet will apply to many of the listed projects: Applique, Buttons and Buttonhole, Crochet, Darts, Facing, Fasteners, Hem, Interfacing/Underlining, Knitting, Lining, Pleats, Pockets, Seam, Seam Finish, Staystitching, Trim (s), Top Stitching and Zipper.

32. Home accent living/family room - any combination of two-piece coordinates for living/family room - slipcovers, lined or unlined curtains/drapes/shades, pillows, lap throw/quilt, remote caddy, ottoman, lamp shade, fireplace mantel scarf, doily, similar item. No full size quilts.
33. Recycled/upcycled furniture - painted, stained, refinished, decoupage, tiled or upholstered furniture or other appropriate technique to recycle/repurpose a piece of furniture. Purchasing an unfinished piece of furniture does not qualify as recycling/repurposing. Must include before & after (furniture displayed showing how it fits a room's décor) photos, description of the process - inspiration/design process, who it was made for, why the need, any special

considerations, other information supporting the finished product. See Recycle and Redesign instruction sheet.

34. Seasonal décor sewn from fabric - same as class 31
35. Design story board - for an "ultimate/ideal" room. Include color scheme, wall treatment, floor treatment, floor plan, etc. Exhibit will consist of a multimedia presentation, notebook or story board (matte/foam core board 20"x15") with above items & description of what was learned. Project can include pictures, samples, diagram of room, drawings, narration, cost comp of supplies, arrangements & budget/cost of project. See Storyboard instruction sheet.

Level 4 - Grades 9-12

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for IDC level 4 proj work: The following headings on the Mastery Sheet will apply to many of the listed projects: Applique, Buttons and Buttonhole, Bias Tape, Couture Technique/ Historic Technique, Crochet, Fasteners, Hem, Interfacing/Underlining, Knitting, Lining, Mitered Corners, Pockets, Seam, Seam Finish, Staystitching, Trim(s), and Zipper.

36. Home accent outdoors/patio/camping - any combination of two-piece coordinates - picnic/BBQ accessories, patio furniture cushions/covers, shades, one placemat with napkin (this is a "set" & does not count as a two-piece coordinate), utensil/condiment caddy, insulated carrier, picnic blanket, outdoor sling chair, hammock, sleeping bag, similar item
37. Design story board - same as class 35
38. Recycled/upcycled furniture - "same as class 33
39. Seasonal décor sewn from fabric - same as class 34

All Grades - IDC

40. Functional home accessory design for "special needs" - *"Special needs" being the individual requirements of a person with a mental, emotional, physical disability or disease. MUST include description of who it was made for, why the need, any special adaptations per the individual's request, & other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Examples: sensory swing/activity station, fidget quilt/blanket/mat, bedding/pillows/lap blanket, weighted/pressure/gravity blanket, bed/chair/walker caddy, bath or kitchen accessory, bedrail, storage, etc. See Citizenship through Service Learning and Sewing for Special Needs instructions.*
41. Seasonal décor non fabric/textile - wall hanging, centerpiece, decoration, similar item. Exhibit is not to be constructed primarily from fabric or any textile based product. It can have some textiles, i.e., lace, ribbon, buttons, etc.
42. Interior design project portfolio - is a great record keeping tool. It will be a valuable source for ideas & future projects, place to share any project work done in IDC, & provide a place to show samples of new techniques or knowledge explored in IDC. The notebook must have 3 sections - 1) Projects/Products, 2) Sample Technique Pages & 3) Creative Inspirations & Ideas. See Design Portfolio instructions. All portfolios will be judged together.

4-H Hobbies/Textile Design & Construction (HTDC)

HTDC projects are made from a textile product created by the exhibitor, unless otherwise stated. A textile is a flexible material made of fiber/thread/yarn. Textiles are formed with various methods including weaving, knitting, crocheting, knotting or felting. Other words for textiles are cloth and fabric.

Level 1 & 2 - Grades 3-6

Project must have at least 2 of the skills for HTDC level 1 & 2 proj work

43. Simple sewn stuffed animal, doll or puppet with both hand and machine stitching techniques. Focused on showing technique mastery/what was learned constructing the finished product.
44. Decorative textile technique - Skill technique(s) being mastered/learned - screen printing, transfer printing, fabric pens, tie dye, batik, stenciling, block printing or similar method applied to a textile foundation, such as clothing (shirt/apron/ accessory), home décor (wall-hanging/picture/pillow/rug/pillowcase) purchased or sewn by exhibitor. Skill techniques in classes 45-49 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on mastery of 1 or more decorative textile techniques, creativity, & mastery of use of design elements & principles.
45. Textile fabric creation - Skill technique(s) being mastered - weaving (beading or textile), latch-hook, braiding, macramé, knitting, crochet, felting, basket weaving or combination of 1 or more of these techniques to create a textile. "Textile" defined as any woven, looped or felted thread or fiber. Textile is to be constructed into a finished end product no larger than 16"x16" or equal surface area (e.g., knitted scarf 6"x42" or macramé plant hanger 8"x32"). Knitted or crocheted exhibits

refer to level 1 & 2 mastery sheets for specific skills/techniques. Focus is on the mastery of 1 or more textile technique(s) used to produce a textile which is incorporated into an end product, creativity & mastery of use of design elements & principles. Examples - toy/game (rug for doll house, doll, ball, etc), home décor (doily, table scarf, pillow, coaster, wall hanging, plant hanger, small basket, linen-dish cloth, scrub, towel, pillow cover, etc), clothing/fashion accessory (hat, scarf, purse/bag, jewelry, etc), similar item. Skill techniques in classes 44, 46-49 are not to be exhibited in this class.

46. Needle art by hand - Skill technique(s) - hand embroidery, counted cross-stitch, needlepoint, crewel embroidery, needle punch or smocking applied to towel, pillowcase, garment, home accessory. Pictures must be framed. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by exhibitor. Focus is on mastery of 1 or more "hand" needle art techniques, creativity, & mastery of use of design elements & principles.
47. Needle art by machine - simple machine embroidery, cross stitch/decorative stitches, or applique applied to small decorative items, home accessories, towel, pillowcase, garment, picture, flag, banner, windsock, etc. Focus is on mastery of 1 or more machine created needle art techniques, creativity, & mastery of use of design elements & principles. No full size quilts.
48. Machine pieced or appliqued item - machine piecing and/or applique in the creation of a "textile/fabric" and then incorporated into an end product. Finished product no larger than 16"x16" or an equal surface area (e.g., fireplace mantel scarf 6"x42".) Focus is on mastery of 1 or more "machine pieced or applique techniques", creativity, & mastery of use of design elements & principles. Examples include picture, wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, flag, banner, windsock, etc. No full size quilts.
49. Repurposed textile creation - Item made from repurposed textile material/product which can be worn/carried or used in the home. Must include before & after (item being worn/displayed, show how it was designed to fit room décor) photos, description of the process- inspiration/design process, who it was made for, why the need, special considerations, other pertinent information for the finished product. Focus on appropriate use of repurposed textile, end product quality product, creativity & application of design elements/ principles. See Recycle & Redesign instruction sheet

Level 3 & 4 - Grades 7-12

Project must have at least 4 of the skills for HTDC level 3 & 4 proj work

50. Stuffed animal, doll or puppet with minimum of 2 hand & 2 machine sewing techniques (embroidered/appliqued/textile) painted facial features, hair constructed from yarn/floss/fur, movable parts (arm, mouth, legs, etc), use of fake fur or similar combination of techniques showing mastery of skill/technique applied to finished product.
51. Decorative textile technique - Design & construction of an apparel/fashion accessory or home décor item from fabric created using 2 or more decorative textile techniques described in class 44. Skill techniques in classes 52-57 are not to be exhibited in this class. Focus is on mastery of technique, creative & appropriate blending of 2 or more decorative textile techniques, fabric/trim fittingly showcase in finished product & mastery of design elements & principles.
52. Textile fabric creation - Design & construction of an original "fabric/trim" using at least 2 techniques described in class 45. No size limit. Additional techniques might include, but not limited to, hand spinning, cotton linter & tatting. Examples - shawl, afghan, stool, socks, etc. Fabric and/or trim must be made into a finished product. Knitted or crocheted exhibits refer to level 3 & 4 mastery sheets for specific skills/techniques. Focus is on the mastery of 2 or more textile technique(s) used to produce a fabric/trim, creative & appropriate use of "fabric/trim" in finished product & mastery of use of design elements & principles. Skill techniques in classes 51, 53-57 are not to be exhibited in this class.
53. Needle art by hand - 2 of the following skill techniques applied to clothing (shirt/apron/jacket/accessory/etc) or home/school/office décor (wall hanging/picture/pillow/rug/pillowcase/quilt/blanket/banner/etc.) by "hand." Techniques include, but not limited to, embroidery (floss, yarn (crewel) or ribbon), cross-stitch, needlepoint needle punch, smocking, Trapunto quilting, hand quilting or similar technique. Base/foundation for needle art can be purchased or sewn by exhibitor. Focus is mastery of 2 or more "hand" needle art techniques, creativity, & mastery of use of design elements & principles. This class is

not intended for pieced quilts. A pieced quilt would be exhibited in class 55 or 56.

54. Needle art by machine - 2 or more of these techniques: original free motion embroidery/thread painting, "modified" commercial/software based embroidery design (must describe modification(s) on skill mastery sheet), Trapunto quilting, quilting, applique or other advanced needle art technique applied to clothing (shirt/apron/jacket/accessory/etc) or home/school/office décor (wall hanging/picture/pillow/rug/pillowcase/quilt/blanket/banner/etc) by machine. Focus is on mastery of 2 or more machine created needle art techniques, creativity & mastery of use of design elements & principles. This class is not intended for pieced quilts. A pieced quilt would be exhibited in class 55 or 56.
55. Hand pieced and/or hand appliqued item finished with hand quilting - piecing and/or applique & quilting must have been done by hand, not by machine. Examples might include: picture or wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, table runner, lap robe, etc. Focus is on mastery of "hand work", creativity & mastery of use of design elements & principles.
56. Machine pieced and/or machine appliqued item finished with machine quilting - Quilting must be done by the exhibitor. Examples might include picture or wall art, pillow, bag, doll quilt, lap robe, table runner, etc. Focus is on mastery of 1 or more "machine pieced or appliqued technique(s)", creativity & mastery of use of design elements & principles.
57. Repurposed textile creation - Item made from repurposed textile material/product which can be worn, used in the home, at school, in the office, on the job, car/boat/vehicle. Must include before & after (picture being worn or displayed, showing how it was designed to fit room décor) photos, description of the process - inspiration/design process, who it was made for, why the need, special considerations, other pertinent information supporting the finished product. Focus is on appropriate selection of textile, appropriate construction techniques for end use, creativity & use of design elements & principles. See [Recycle & Redesign](#) instruction sheet

All Grades - HTDC

58. Hobbies and textiles design project portfolio - is a great record keeping tool. It will be a valuable source for ideas & future projects, a place to share any project work done in HTDC & provide a place to show samples of new techniques or knowledge explored in HTDC. The notebook must have 3 sections - 1) Projects/Products, 2) Sample Technique Pages & 3) Creative Inspirations & Ideas. See [Design Portfolio](#) instructions. All portfolios will be judged together.
59. Quilts of valor community service - Group or individually constructed quilt, constructed for the express purpose of being presented to a veteran as part of Quilts of Valor program. If available, attach the presentation script used in the awards ceremony or a copy of the report submitted to Quilts of Valor. Pictures of the presentation are welcome, be sure to have veteran's approval to use their picture in display.

307 4-H BABYSITTING/CHILD CARE

PREMIUMS: 1st-\$4.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00, 4th-\$1.00

Junior (Grades 3-7)

1. Baby Book: Any practical size, minimum of 5 pages covering at least 9-10 months of development. Includes photographs, drawings, mementos and comments on developmental milestones. Must be clear that 4-H'er has contributed child development information to book. Baby books prepared earlier by parents may not be entered unless 4-H'er reworks the information. Handwriting should be the youth preparing the exhibit, not an adult.
2. Puzzles Help Children Learn: Any Size. Two puzzles developmentally appropriate for children at 2 distinct age and ability levels. Each puzzle must have its own storage container. Puzzles must be sturdy & covered so can be cleaned with damp cloth. Describe the child for whom each puzzle would be appropriate by giving child's age, interest, ability. Puzzles should be suitable for either boys or girls. Do not indicate a puzzle is for boys or girls only. Commercially made puzzles are not eligible.
3. Child Care Poster: Must be 14"x22" & must be permanently signed & dated on the back prior to lamination. Choose one of these topics to develop poster: Behavior & Guidance - include pictures and facts about child development; Safety Risks & Procedures - include common safety risks that a babysitter needs to be aware of and procedures to address the safety issue; Ages & Stages of Development
4. Basic First Aid: Create a basic first aid kit from scratch (not a purchased kit) that includes basic supplies to take care of small accidents such as bumps, scrapes, stings & sprains. Include an emergency contact list in first aid kit that includes, but is not limited

to: emergency numbers for police, fire department, poison control, veterinarian, etc. Include supply list & cost to put the kit together. The kit should be in a container with a lid or zipper closure. Make sure there is a label on the kit identifying it as a "First Aid Kit".

Senior (Grades 8-12)

5. Children's Book: Written, illustrated & constructed by 4-H'er. May be written for a specific child with text relating to that child or for children of certain age range. Indicate appropriate age range. Construction paper, computer printout, cloth or poster board may be used. Illustrations may be drawn, photographs, appliques, magazine pictures or reassembled from other books.
6. Surprise Suitcase: Fill suitcase with homemade or store bought items for children you babysit. Could include books, puzzles, games, play dough, balls & costumes. Indicate appropriate age child to use each item. Include records of how children responded to materials. Package in suitcase that can be taken to the home. May include commercial puzzles. Contents need to be in a suitcase or a container with a lid.
7. Create a Game: Create a board game or card game to teach a specific topic to a child. Examples might include, but are not limited to: hygiene practices, exercise & fitness, safety, etc. Game boards must be 14"x22" & must be permanently signed & dated. Laminated board, cards & pieces so they are durable. Include written instructions of the game. Note in the instructions, the age appropriateness of the game.

308 4-H FOOD SCIENCE EXHIBITS

4-H members can enter one exhibit per class, but are restricted to exhibits designed for his/her grade group.

For 2021, removed Food Preparation Exhibits-classes 1-8.

Food Preservation Exhibits

Dried foods should be exhibited in a sealed, plastic sandwich bag. Canned foods should be placed in colorless, standard canning jars such as those made by Kerr, Ball, etc., and properly sealed with two piece lids (no paraffin on jams and jellies). Other types of jars will be rejected. Jar rings should be left on for display. Judges will remove the screw-bands at time of judging. Labels should be neat and plainly written. Jars of jams and jellies may be evaluated for taste in addition to traditional elements.

Level Two - Grades 3-5

9. One pint or half pint jar of jam or jelly processed in boiling water canner

10. Two pieces of fruit leather

11. One pint or half pint of salsa/ picante sauce

Level Three - Grades 6-8

12. One pint jar cucumber pickles or vegetable relish

13. One pint or quart of any single canned fruit (not pickled)

14. Dried fruit (1/2 cup of a single dried fruit). Display in sealed plastic sandwich/freezer bag.

Level Four - Grades 9-12

15. One pint or quart jar pressure canned vegetables (no tomatoes or pickles)

16. One quart or one pint jar of plain canned tomatoes.

Entries are limited to 30 pages for the collection, plus an additional page for the objective of the collection. Plastic cover pages are acceptable. The criteria for judging will be: 1) Appearance and neatness; 2) readability; 3) material relates to chosen topic; 4) brief written description telling purpose of objective of your collection.

NOTE: Metered postage marks must not be used in non-metered exhibits and non-metered postmarks in metered classes. Collections from a commercial source are not eligible for exhibit (i.e. through a postal society membership.) At least one-third of the postmarks in any collection must have been added during the current project year. All entries must be clearly marked on the front cover or inside the front cover with the member's name and county. 4-H'ers may enter one exhibit per class in their grade group.

PREMIUMS: 1st-\$4.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00, 4th-\$1.00

All exhibits must illustrate applications and utilize electrical energy. The exhibit must have been constructed by the exhibitor during the year exhibited and must meet electrical safety standards. All exhibits, except lamps, will be judged on electrical wiring and connections, electrical components, usefulness of exhibit, working condition, complexity and design, appearance, originality, workmanship and safety. Lamps will be judged as described for each class. A 4-H member can have only one exhibit in each class.

1. **Electrical projects (grades 3-7)** Entries to include electromagnets, motors, buzzers & direct current circuit boards
2. **Kit Lamps (Kit Construction)-(all grades)** Electrical wiring and connections, light source, and suitability as a reading lamp will be judged. Lamps can be floor, desk or wall models.
3. **Original Lamps - (all grades)** Originality, workmanship, electrical wiring and connections, light source, and suitability as a reading lamp will be judged. Lamps can be floor, desk, or wall models. (No kits.)
4. **Rewired Lamps - (all grades)** Workmanship, craftsmanship and electrical wiring and connections will be judged. The lamp will not be judged as a reading lamp.
5. **Electric and Electronic Circuits - (grades 3-7)** Exhibit should be mounted on a board and clearly show all circuits. The exhibit should be operational and demonstrate a useful principle or be functional. The exhibit should include an explanation of the principal being demonstrated.
6. **Electric and Electronic Circuits - (grades 8-12)** Same as class 5.
7. **Exhibit - (grades 8-12)** Exhibit demonstrating skill or knowledge such as wire sizing; proper wiring of electrical cord plug, wall outlet, wall switch, 3-way switch, etc. Exhibit should include an explanation of the principal being demonstrated.
8. **Exhibit - (grades 8-12)** Exhibit of wiring diagram for a home, building, or electric supply system for a community.
9. **Electric Concepts Poster - (grades 3-7)** Poster (14"x22"). Exhibit showing a basic electric concept of explaining the proper use of electricity in modern life.

10. **Electronics/Lighting Selection Poster (grades 8-12)** Poster (14"x22"). Exhibit is on information that consumers might use in selecting any electronic devices such as computers, games, telephones, lighting fixtures, bulbs or other electronic device.

Posters must be 14"x22". If you use text, pictures, drawings, artwork or other information not created by you in your exhibit you must cite the source.

315 4-H ENTOMOLOGY - INSECT EXHIBITS

The exhibits are planned to build on prior educational experience. A 4-H member may enter only one insect collection. All insects must be mounted on standard insect pins which can be purchased from the State 4-H Office. Each insect should be identified by their common name. A typed master list indicating the scientific order and common name of each specimen should accompany the display. The master list document is located at <http://4h.okstate.edu/events-anc-activities/oklahoma-state-fairs>.

Exhibit collections for Classes 1-5 are allowed a maximum of 5 foreign and/or out-of-state collected insects. Exhibits in Classes 2-5 must be in insect display boxes measuring 19"x16.5"x3". This is the size of a Cornell University Drawer. These boxes can be purchased or made using the pattern available at <http://4h.okstate.edu/events-anc-activities/oklahoma-state-fairs>.

Boxes that are not this size will be **disqualified**. At least one third of the specimens in any collection must have been collected during the current project year.

1. **First Year:** The exhibit shall consist of 25 adult insects (representing at least 5 orders) which are displayed in a Folding Insect Storage Box 9"x13"x2.5". This box can be purchased in bulk at <http://www.bioquip.com/search/DispProduct.asp?pid=1002F> or individually from the State 4-H Office. Cover with plastic wrap.
2. **Second Year:** The second year exhibit shall consist of 40 adult insects (representing 8 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above
3. **Third Year:** The third year exhibit shall consist of 50 adult insects (representing 10 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above
4. **Fourth Year:** The fourth year exhibit shall consist of 75 adult insects (representing 12 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above
5. **Fifth Year and Beyond:** The exhibit shall consist of 100 adult insects (representing 14 orders) which are displayed in the insect display box as indicated above. There is no limit on the number of years this class may be entered, if exhibit has additions or major modifications. At least 1/3 of the specimens in any collection must have been collected during the current project year, building upon previous collections.

6. **Self-Determined Entomology Exhibit:** Designed to allow exhibitors to prepare educational entomology exhibits. Exhibits should be educational, neat & attractive, & easy to understand. A 1 page written report explaining the nature or purpose of the project must accompany the exhibit.

4-H HONEY EXHIBIT

Only 1 exhibit allowed in each class per individual. Honey should be placed in colorless 1 pint honey jars or standard, colorless 1 pint fruit jars, such as made by Kerr, Ball, Mason, etc. Other types of jars will be rejected. Jar covers should be new, if possible, & screwed on tightly to prevent leakage. There should be 1/4"-1/2" of air space below the lid. Honey should be clear & free from foreign particles. Comb honey should be perfectly capped, free from stains, bee-bread & fingerprints. Edges should be clean-cut, not ragged. 1 piece only in each jar; as wide as jar mouth will permit & 3.5"-4" in length. Labels should be neat & plainly written or printed and include Name, Club, Type of Honey & Month/Year collected.

Tree Leaf Exhibits

Exhibits in classes 1-3 must conform to requirements, including labeling and display requirements, outlined in 4-H fact sheet #236. "Collecting and Exhibiting Tree Leaves" (revised 9/2007)

1. **Grades 3-5.** Collection of 10 leaves from trees native to Oklahoma (no introduced species). 1 specimen must be from a native evergreen - pine or juniper. Include a twig and buds with each broadleaf specimen. Exhibit must be properly labeled and displayed on board 22" wide and 28" tall.

2. **Grades 6-8.** Collection of 15 leaf specimens, representing at least 3 of the 5 basic leaf types, from trees native to Oklahoma (no introduced species). 2 specimens must be from a native awl or scale-leaf evergreen - pine or juniper. Non-native species are acceptable only if they have been introduced for planting windbreaks & shelterbelts. Include a twig with buds with each broadleaf specimen. Exhibit must be properly labeled and displayed on board 28" tall and 44" wide.

3. **Grades 9-12.** Collection of 20 leaf specimens, representing 4 of the 5 basic leaf types, from trees native to Oklahoma. 3 specimens must be from needle, scale or awl-leaf evergreens. Species of pine not native to Oklahoma are acceptable if they have been introduced for planting windbreaks & shelterbelts. The palmate leaf sample must come from a native Oklahoma species.

WOOD SAMPLE EXHIBIT

Wood sample exhibits should conform to instructions outlined by grade group in Oklahoma 4-H Fact Sheet #238 "Wood Sample Exhibits" (revised 2/2007) All members should use the guidelines for Class II Exhibits

4. **All grades.** The exhibit shall consist of 8 wood samples (4 hardwoods & 4 softwoods) mounted on plywood 1/4" thick x 22" wide x 20" high.

SELF-DETERMINED EXHIBIT

Exhibit suggestions are listed in 4-H Members Guide, "4-H Forestry. Self-Determined Exhibits." Pub. #239 (revised 3/05). The exhibit shall consist of a poster, model, or any one of a great number of other creative efforts by the club member which relates to the science & technology of forestry or is otherwise directly related to forestry. Display not to exceed 36"x36" or poster not to exceed 14"x22".

Any eligible 4-H member may participate in collecting, identifying, and preparing a rock-mineral-fossil exhibit. Individual 4-H member can enter 1 exhibit per class. Rock-mineral-fossil exhibitors should securely display their specimens in a box no larger than 24"x24". Box can be wood, plastic or cardboard and have a method of covering the rocks, minerals & fossils. Each sample should be mounted or in a compartment & labeled in a neat, orderly manner. Labels should include common name, date, location found and mineral use. At least 1/3 of the specimens in any collection must have been added during the current project year.

Rock-Mineral-Fossil Exhibits

1. 15 different unpolished rocks, minerals or fossils collected from Oklahoma.

2. 30 different unpolished rocks, minerals or fossils, including specimens of sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic.

3. Self determined exhibit - Educational exhibit depicting some phase of geology, testing of minerals, polished rocks, etc. Display should not exceed 24"x24".

Energy/Petroleum Exhibits Posters on 14"x22" poster board.

Junior - grades 3-5

4. Poster on well site safety

5. Energy/Petroleum Display. Subject of the display should be petroleum products; different types of energy and how they work; or different careers in energy.

6. Energy/Petroleum Science Experimental Display (Science Fair type) 4-H members are encouraged to use their 4-H projects as the basis for their scientific research & discovery; use the scientific method to gain an understanding of how things work & the variables that affect them; take an open & creative approach to problem solving; learn that a successful outcome is based not on personal opinion but on scientific fact; use written & visual communication skills.

Intermediate - grades 6-8

7. Photography Exhibit over a state park or geological region. Four photos mounted on 14"x14" poster board with detailed explanations and information.

8. Poster on Water Mineral Issue. Subject of poster should be one of the following:

- What water hardness & mineral testing can determine
- Secondary recovery methods
- Dangers of lead in the water

9. Energy or Petroleum Science Experimental Display (Science-Fair type) Same description as Class 6.

Senior - grades 9-12

10. Poster of a press release; collected about the energy information & your interpretation; possibly the Energy Index or other topic.

11. Energy or Petroleum Display. Subject of the display should be areas of the Oklahoma Energy Index; different drilling techniques & how they work; or careers in the energy industry.

12. Energy or Petroleum Science Experimental Display (Science-Fair type) Same description as Class 6.

318 4-H WILDLIFE PROJECTS

PREMIUMS: 1st-\$4.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00, 4th-\$1.00

Only 1 exhibit allowed in each class per individual in their respective grade category. Exhibits will be judged on the basis of instructions & standards explained in the "4-H Project Wildlife Exhibit Preparation Guidelines (#720 revised 12/06) which is available from the County Extension Office or OK 4-H website.

Self-Determined Exhibits - To encourage members to develop their own learning projects. For ideas & guidelines for exhibits, see 4-H publication #721 "4-H Wildlife Self-Determined Projects (revised 12/06)" and 4-H NREM 624 "Creating a Wildlife Resource Map". Include references for information. At least 1 reference must be from a source other than the internet. All exhibits should be the original work of the 4-H member. When information is taken from books, publications, magazines or the internet, it should be expressed in the 4-H members own words.

Oklahoma Wildlife

Exhibits entered in this section should relate to a specific category of game or non-game animals or birds.

Junior - grades 3-7

1. A collection of 15 different kinds of plants, trees or shrubs known to provide food or cover for wildlife, mounted on food & cover cards or a seed board with 15 different kinds of seeds eaten by wildlife. (See 4-H Lit. #720 updated 12/06.) No more than 4 varieties may be cultivated crops. Specimens must have been collected during the current project year. For each plant or seed, list 1 wildlife species that uses that plant or seed on the cover card or board. All plant species must be native to Oklahoma except that up to 4 of the plants (or seeds) may be from cultivated crops.

2. Scrapbook of Oklahoma Wildlife (cutouts, pictures or drawings) of at least 5 mammals, 5 birds & 5 reptiles or amphibians. Give common name & what habitat they can be found in. Common names should be specific (black rat snake, pygmy rattlesnake, etc)

3. Exhibit of the tracks of 8 wild animals or birds commonly found in Oklahoma. POSITIVE plaster casts should be mounted on masonite or plywood, not to exceed 12"x24". Label each track with kind of animal or bird, which county track was found in, what habitat it was found in & what date the track was cast.

4. Self Determined Exhibit. Posters must be 14"x22". Displays must not exceed 3'X4'. Possible examples include but not limited to a display dealing with methods of identification of waterfowl, a poster on wildlife, or environmental careers. See Lit. #721 "Self Determined 4-H Wildlife and Fisheries Project Ideas" revised 12/06 for additional examples.

Senior - grades 8-12

5. A collection of 30 plants known to furnish food or cover for wildlife, mounted on food & cover cards or a seed board with 30 plant seeds known to furnish food or cover for wildlife. No more than 6 varieties may be cultivated crops. At least half of the specimens must have been collected during the current project year. For each plant or seed include 3 wildlife species that use that plant or seed (on the cover card or board). Species names must be used for both plants and wildlife in addition to the common name. All species must be native to Oklahoma except that up to 6 may be from cultivated crops.

6. Evaluation of an Oklahoma habitat type that includes a general description of the habitat plant & animal species (species names must be used for plants & wildlife in addition to the common names) that occur within the habitat; a range map showing the habitat's distribution within Oklahoma; & threats to that habitat. Examples of possible habitats include: playa lakes, tallgrass prairie, cross timbers & shortgrass prairie.

7. Self Determined Exhibit. Posters must be 14"x22". Displays must not exceed 3'X4'. Possible examples include but are not limited to: description of a Wildlife Management Area detailing area, location, habitat management & wildlife population trends (if known); or a poster with an emphasis on the life cycle, status, range map & habitat of an Oklahoman threatened or endangered species. Species names must be used for plants & wildlife in addition to common names. See Lit. #721 "Self Determined 4-H Wildlife & Fisheries Project Ideas" revised 12/06 for examples.

4-H Fisheries

Junior - grades 3-7

8. Display board showing steps in tying two kinds of fishing knot used in tying lines or leaders. Use cord instead of fishing line. Mount on board suitable for hanging, not to exceed 12"x12".

9. Notebook describing habits & appearance of 5 fish found in Oklahoma. Information on each fish to include photo, drawing or cut-out picture, proper common name, kind of food eaten, distinctive physical characteristics, best ways to catch & other topics of interest to anglers.

10. Display of 5 member assembled lures, together with the materials from which they were assembled, mounted on a board not to exceed 12"x16". Lures may be spinners, jigs, flies, plugs or a combination of these. May be entirely homemade or assembled from purchased supplies.

11. Self Determined Fish Project. Educational report, display or project created by the member. Topic to deal with fish, fishing, fish farming, aquatic food chains or pollution in Oklahoma waters. Displays not to exceed 3'x3'. Posters must be 14"x22".

Senior - grades 8-12

12. Notebook describing habits & appearance of 10 fish found in Oklahoma. Information on each fish to include photo, drawing or cut-out picture, proper common name, kind of food eaten, distinctive physical characteristics, best ways to catch & other topics of interest to anglers.

13. Display of 5 fishing flies tied by the exhibitor. The material & shape of the exhibit will be exhibitor's choice, but cannot exceed 12"x12" in size. Attach report to exhibit to indicate the following about each fly on the board: type of fly, type of fish it is used to catch, habitat conditions it is used in & cost to purchase or make.

14. Display of 5 fishing lures. Lures may be any type commonly used in sport fishing. The material & shape of the exhibit board will be exhibitor's choice, but cannot exceed 12"x12". Attach report to exhibit to indicate the following about each lure on the board: type of lure, type of fish it is used to catch, habitat conditions it is used in & cost to purchase or make.

15. Self Determined Fish Project. Educational report, display or project created by the member. Topic to deal with fish, fishing, fish farming, aquatic food chains or pollution in Oklahoma waters. Displays not to exceed 3'x3'. Posters must be 14"x22".

17. Display of a single unit bird house, home constructed (may be from a kit) with a 3"x5" index card tacked to the house with the following information: 1) What bird species was house built for; 2)

What habitat & site location (should include height) the house will be placed in. Should be functional & not decorative.

18. Notebook of 15 pictures, drawings or photos of birds seen & identified by member & labeled with common name of each.

19. Self Determined Poster (14"x22"). See "Self Determined 4-H Wildlife & Fisheries Project Ideas" Oklahoma 4-H Pub. #721 (revised 12/06) for ideas. See 4-H Wildlife Project Lit. No. 720 "Exhibit Preparation Guidelines Leaders/Members Guide" (revised 12/06) for guidelines.

20. Observation report for Bird Feeder used during previous year, including photo of feeder at location used. May use feeder constructed or a purchased feeder. (report #723 found on OK Lit. On-line under Wildlife & Fisheries)

21. Observation report for Bird House used during previous year, including photo of feeder at location used (report #724 found on OK Lit. On-line under Wildlife & Fisheries). May use birdhouse constructed or a purchased house.

Senior - grades 8-12

22. Bird habitat improvement exhibit. Notebook of pictures or drawings explaining how exhibitor is developing or improving a bird habitat. This exhibit may be added to or continued from year to year as the habitat improvements are implemented.

23. Notebook of bird feeder or nest/house observation records for more than current year. Include picture of house or feeder at location used with some analysis of comparisons in observations for years observed. (Observation reports are on OK Lit. Online under Wildlife Fisheries, "Birds and Nest Observation" #772; "Bird Feeding Station" #723; and "Bird Observation" #724)

24. Self Determined Bird Project. Poster must be 14"x22". Display must not exceed 3'X4'. See "Self Determined 4-H Wildlife & Fisheries Project Ideas" Oklahoma 4-H Pub. #721 (12/06) for ideas. See 4-H Wildlife Project Lit. No. 720 "Exhibit Preparation Guidelines Leaders/Members Guide" (12/06) for guidelines.

4-H Wildflower Study

At least one-third of the specimens must have been collected during current project year. See information on pressing plants in "Leaf Pressing & Collecting Hints" 4-H Publication No. 237 Rev. 04/04) to prepare plants for collections & exhibits. Diagrams & posters should be hand generated & not downloaded from internet or computer. "Wildflower Card" (OK 4-H Lit. #718) can be downloaded from OK 4-H Lit. online under Wildlife & Fisheries.

Junior - grades 3-7

25. Collection of 18 Oklahoma wildflowers properly pressed & mounted on wildflower cards. Label with common name flower family & tell location & date collected. Display in a notebook.

26. Drawing or diagram showing parts of a wildflower blossom, not to exceed 8½"x11".

27. Self Determined Poster (14"x22"). See "Self Determined" 4-H Wildlife & Fisheries Project Ideas" Oklahoma 4-H Pub. #721 (rev. 12/06) for ideas and 4-H Wildlife Project Lit. No. 720 "Exhibit Preparation Guidelines Leaders/Members Guide" (rev. 12/06).

28. Display 2 principle wildflower families showing 4 or more pressed flowers of each family labeled with common name. A brief description of each flower family should be included. Poster must be 14"x22" or display in a notebook.

29. Make a collection, mount & press, leaves of plants showing leaf arrangements (opposite, alternate, whorled); types of leaves (simple, pinnately compound, palmately compound); leaf margins (toothed, smooth, lobed). Poster must be 14"x22" or display in notebook on card stock pages or wildflower cards (Lit # 718).

Senior - grades 8-12

30. Collection of 25 Oklahoma wildflowers properly pressed & mounted on wildflower cards. Label with common name, scientific name, flower family, location collected, date collected & habitat collected from. Display in a notebook.

31. Make a collection & mount for display at least 15 kinds of wild flower seed that show various adaptations to dispersal by wind, water, birds & mammals.

32. Special collections. Collection of specimens in some special category, i.e. 1 family, poisonous, dyes, edibles or specific season such as early spring. Poster must be 14"x22" or displayed in a notebook on card stock pages or wildflower cards (Lit. # 718).

319 4-H ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

A 4-H member may enter 1 exhibit per class, but is restricted to those exhibits designed for his/her grade group. Exhibits will be judged based on the criteria outlined in the 4-H project fact sheets

available from County Extension Office. Include references for information. At least one reference must be from a source other than the internet. Posters must not be printed directly from the internet - this is plagiarism.

1. Vermi Composting (with Worms) (grades 3-7) Compost sample & poster that explains how to compost with worms. Must include report for 1 or more of the following areas: bins for vermi composting, feeding & care, moisture requirements, harvesting compost. Poster must be 14"x22" and include a photograph of your compost bin. One pint of compost (worm castings) in a sandwich-size zip-lock bag or pint jar with lid must be included.

2. Exploring Streams and Lakes Poster (grades 3-7) Poster (14"x22") with photos showing a stream, lake or pond you have visited. Photos should show things like shorelines or creek banks, appearance of the water, condition of vegetation on the shore or banks, & problem areas such as erosion, trash or obvious pollution. For ideas read Lit. #19. "Water Quality of Streams & Lakes" Report form is #20. Each photo must have a caption explaining what it shows. Overall, the poster should tell what you think is helping or harming the water or the plants & animals that live there. Changes should be shown over time for projects after the first year. Poster title should include name of water body, if it has one, & town or county where located.

3. Water Critters (grades 3-7) Display a collection of pond, lake or stream critters (invertebrates only-no animals with backbones e.g., fish or frogs) preserved in one to three baby food jars with rubbing alcohol as described in Lit. #21 "Aquatic Organism". Securely attach completed Critter ID bookmark (Lit. # 29 "Stream & Lake Critter Identification") to the jar using tape & string around the jar neck. Do not include more than one of each type of critter. Collect only critters found on or in the water, not adult flies. Write a short paragraph telling about the value of water critters - read & summarize in own words Lit. #21 or related materials. Optional: Include 1 single-sided page of labeled photos or drawings of the site or collecting activity.

4. Where Does My Water Come From Poster (grades 3-7) Poster (14"x22") showing or describing the source of your water (lake, aquifer, private well) and/or what is done to it (water treatment plant, in home filtration system) before it gets to your home. See Lit # 19 "Water Quality of Stream" for ideas.

5. Natural Resources of My County Poster (grades 3-7) Poster (14"x22") with your photos showing a mixture of local natural resources like prairies, forests, scenic views, water bodies, agriculture, wildlife or similar things. Each photo must have a caption naming the resource. Overall, the poster should convince the reader that your county is a great place to live. Poster title should be at least 1 inch tall & include name of your county.

6. Recycled Item (grades 3-7) - useable item made from trash other than craft type item. Original ideas & useful items will rank higher. Attach 3"x5" card listing all materials used.

7. Aquatic Habitat Poster (grades 3-7) Poster (14"x22") with photos showing a stream, lake or pond you have visited. Photos should illustrate distinct habitats such as shoreline vegetation, undercut banks, rocky shores, riffles, pools or runs. Each photo must have a caption explaining what it shows. For more ideas read Lit. #21. "Aquatic Organism" Overall, the poster should comment on things you observed that could be helping or harming the critters or their habitat. Changes should be shown over time for projects after the initial year. Poster title should include name of water body, if it has one, & town or county where located.

8. Homemade Stream or Lake Sampling Equipment (grades 3-7) Display one piece of stream or lake sampling equipment that you have made. Write a 1 page report explaining its purpose & how to use it. Some possibilities include Secchi disks, plankton tows, deep water samplers & kick nets. See TVA booklet, "Homemade Sampling Equipment" for instructions on how to make equipment. Optional: Include 1 single-sided page of labeled photos or drawings showing equipment in use.

9. What Is A Watershed? Poster (grades 8-12) Poster (14"x22") Describe what watersheds are & how they work. Title must contain the word, "watershed". See Literature #24 "Human Impact on Streams" for ideas.

10. Natural Resources of My County Poster (grades 8-12) Description same as Class 5.

11. Stream, Pond or Lake Poster (grades 8-12) Poster (14"x22") with photos showing a stream, lake or pond you have visited. Poster should show things people have done or might do along the shore or in the watershed that can harm this stream, pond or lake. For ideas, read Lit #'s 21 & 24. Poster title must include name of water body & town or county where located.

12. Water Critters (grades 8-12) Display a collection of pond, lake or stream critters (invertebrates only-no animals with backbones e.g., fish or frogs) preserved in baby food jars with rubbing alcohol

as described in Lit #21 "Aquatic Organism". Collect in only 1 water body. Separate critters from different habitats into different jars, labeled with habitat name. Do not include more than 1 of each type of critter in each collection jar. Collect only critters found on or in the water, not adult flies. Write a 1 page report on 3 of your critters explaining how they are adapted to their habitat. Read Lit. #21 for ideas. Use the Bookmark Critter ID rating form instructions (Lit. # 29) to calculate water quality rating for your water body & include results in your report.

13. Homemade Stream or Lake Sampling Equipment (grades 8-12) Description same as Class 8.

14. Illegal Dumping Poster (grades 8-12) - Poster (14"x22") Discourage illegal dumping & explain how illegal dumps can contaminate water or create other problems.

15. Landfill Display (grades 8-12) Display showing how landfills work. Display not to exceed 3'x4'.

16. Recycled Item (grades 8-12) - useable item made from trash other than craft type item. Original ideas & useful items will rank higher. Attach 3"x5" card listing all materials used.

17. Group Environmental Project Display (all grades) - Exhibit is a display & written report of an environmental project carried out by 4 or more 4-H members under supervision of 4-H leader. The project may focus on any area of environmental stewardship including recycling, education about local environmental issue, planting trees or other interest area. Display not to exceed 3'x4'.

Judging criteria:

- Project description & statement of purpose & objectives.
- Creativity & quality of project.
- A brief summary of project activities, extent to which objectives were achieved, knowledge gained, significance of the project to the environment in the community, & number of people involved and/or impacted by project.
- Media campaign. Include copies of newspaper clippings & other publicity related to the project.
- Photographs may be included.

18. Individual Self-Directed Environmental Stewardship Project (all grades) - Educational report, display or exhibit on the efforts of the member to protect or improve the environment in or near his/her community. Projects may include topics such as protecting water quality, recycling, illegal dumping, household hazardous wastes, reducing soil erosion on farmland, controlling urban runoff or other topics relevant to the community. Project may include: hands-on efforts (such as controlling erosion by tree planting or use of buffer strips), educational programs conducted in the community, including numbers reached & newspaper clippings or a combination of hands-on & educational.

- d. Newspaper clippings & other publicity of the project.

Guidelines:

Companion Animal Poster illustrating one of the following: Animal Health and/or Nutrition; Good Husbandry and/or Grooming; Training and/or Showing; Service and/or Citizenship.

RIBBONS WILL BE AWARDED

The Cloverbud Program is for prospective 4-H'ers between the ages of 5 and 8. Cloverbud projects should be made entirely by the Cloverbud member; however, supervision by an older 4-H member or adult is encouraged. There are instructions and guidelines for projects available at the Extension Office.

1. **Home Environment** Example: pencil holder, personalized place mat, recipe card holder, recipe box, egg carton treasure box or jewelry case
2. **Fashion and Fabrics** - must have some sewing
3. **Decorated Shirt** - with bows, ribbons, buttons, etc
4. **Photography, Picture Story** – must consist of 3-4 pictures taken by Cloverbud member. Title and caption may be used. Topics might be "My favorite....." or "What I did this summer."
5. **Foods** – no baked item, example: popcorn or trail mix
6. **Posters** – must be on legal size paper or 1/4 of poster board, 11"x15". May freehand or use pictures to explain topic. Suggested topics include: Basic Four Food Groups, a correct table setting, promotional poster to recruit Cloverbud members or to promote an event.
7. **Horticulture** – Example: a container garden, terrarium or a vegetable grown by a Cloverbud member
8. **Arts and Crafts** – Any type of craft item such as bead work, foam art, paper art, felt art or embroidery; and pictures made with any type of medium.
9. **Bird House** – may be made from a plastic container such as pop bottle
10. **Bird Feeder** – may be made from a plastic container

FFA EXHIBITS DIVISION

General Rules

Non-mechanical booths may include lights that do not flash, move, or rotate.
